## The candidates Six candidates eye Family Court posts

Six candidates will square off for three seats as Family Court judges on Election Day.

Having prevailed in both the Republican and Conservative primaries, incumbent Arthur Abrams and candidates W. Bromley Hall and David Freundlich will appear on both of those lines.

Running on the Democratic line will be incumbent Judge Harry Seidell, and candidates Morton I. Willen and Walter G. Steindler.

Abrams, Seidell and Hall also have the Right to Life endorsement, while Seidell, Willen and Steindler will be listed on the ballot on an independent line called "Vote Children '88."

In addition, Seidell is running on a second independent line, "Citizens Against Rising Electric Rates."

Seidell, 60, of Dix Hills, was appointed to the Family Court position in March of this year. He previously served for 10 years as County Court judge and for six years as a judge in the district courts. He is a graduate of St. John's University Law School and of Queens College, is married, and has two daughters and one son. Seidell is a past commander of the American Legion Post 1081 and is active in the

Knights of Columbus, the Holy Name Society and the Catholic Youth Organization (C.Y.O.).

Steindler, 60, of Coram, is a partner in the law firm of Sarisohn, Sarisohn, Carner, Steindler, LeBow & Braun.

Steindler has been a practicing attorney for nearly 35 years, with 20 years of concentration in matrimonial law. As assistant county attorney in charge of the Family Court Section from January 1970 to June 1971, he has

handled a variety of juvenile justice matters. He also served as town attorney for Babylon in 1968 and 1969. He

is a graduate of Queens College and of the New York University School of Law and served two years in the Army Signal Corps. He

previously ran as candidate for town justice, for the Family Court and as candidate for the Fifth Assembly District.

Former Family Court Judge Morton I. Willen, 60, of Northport, served 10 years as a Family Court judge in Suffolk County, the last two years as acting Supreme Court justice in the matrimonial division. He is

an adjunct professor at Touro Law School in Huntington, where he recently taught courses in family law. Currently he is engaged in

the practice of law with the firm of Labert & Lang in Hauppauge. He is a graduate of St. John's Law School and his wife, Mildred, is a psychotherapist.

Abrams, 63, of St. James, is completing 20 years as Family Court judge, serving as administrative judge in the Family Court for 18 years. He is married, with two children, and is a graduate of Hobart College in upstate New York and New York University Law School.

Abrams has a long involvement in professional and community organizations including serving as former president and member of the board of directors of the state Association of Family Court Justices and as a member of the Office of Court Administration Family Court Rules and Advisory Committee.

Prior to becoming judge, he served as town attorney in Smithtown from 1964 to 1967 and is active in the Boy Scouts of America, the Lions Club and is one of the founders of the Commack Volunteer Ambulance Corps.

Freundlich, 42, of Dix Hills, is currently on a leave of absence from his position as chief assistant district attorney in Suffolk. He has been with the district at-



## Candidates For Judge To Be Named

Long Island Republicans and Democrats each plan to nominate 10 candidates — five from each county — for State Supreme Court tonight.

The nominees for 10 judicial seats in the 10th Judicial District, which encompasses Nassau and Suffolk, will appear on the Nov. 5 ballot.

Nassau Republicans are virtually certain to nominate two Republican incumbents for re-election, Angelo Roncallo and Howard Levitt. They are also expected to nominate District Court Judge Edward McCarty, whose Reserve unit was called up during the war with Iraq, Eugene Weisbein, former Hempstead Town board member, and Ed Hart, counsel to the Nassau Republican Committee, party sources say. However, Nassau GOP Chairman Joseph Mondello said no decisions had been made as of late yesterday afternoon.

Nassau Democratic Chairman John W. Matthews said his party plans to nominate Alan Winick, a county court judge temporarily assigned to State Supreme Court; Marilyn Friedenbergl, appointed to the State Supreme Court bench several months ago; Ray Grunewald, a private attorney; Jeff Brown, Winick's law clerk, and Saul Weinstein, a private attorney.

Suffolk Republicans plan to nominate Gail Prudenti, a lawyer with a private practice and daughter of late Suffolk GOP leader Anthony Prudenti. They also plan to nominate Family Court Judge Howard Berler, District Court Judge Lawrence Newmark, and two incumbent judges, Lester E. Gerard and James A. Gowan, sources said.

Suffolk Democrats plan to nominate Walter Steindler, a private attorney; State Supreme Court Justice Mary Margaret Werner; District Court Judge Anthony Corso; District Court Judge Peter J. Newman, and Family Court Judge James F. Doyle.
